

Hair or No Hair is a short dramatic film about a young Black woman. She has been hiding behind wigs for years until her Alopecia is exposed publicly. She uses this experience as a catalyst to break free of the shame she feels towards her baldness.

The story follows Bel Davis, a young Black woman who used to be a model before her hair loss and now works as an Librarian. She wears a wig to hide away from the world, wrapped up in shame and embarrassment over her baldness. One day, she forgets to take food with her Alopecia medication and faints, her wig falls off resulting in being exposed publicly. However, a little black girl with short hair helps Bel up and encourages her to let go of outside expectations. Just when she attempts to go out without a wig; she runs into her hair obsessed ex modelling agent. This interaction leaves Bel defeated once again. However, Bel then sees a confident Bald, Black woman walking down the street without shame. Bel is entranced by this woman and she finally begins to open up to the idea of living her life...Bald.



Filmmaker Statement

The genesis of this project begins with my own personal experience. After being diagnosed with Alopecia in 2015, I've navigated the various stages of hair loss, which ignited a profound shift in my perception of beauty. As a Black woman, I've spent a significant portion of my life being aware of my hair, not for my comfort, but for the convenience of others. When Alopecia divested me of my hair, it also divested me of societal expectations, allowing me to redefine my personal standard of beauty. This narrative, one of self-acceptance and liberation, is a story I believe must be shared.

The vision for this film is to illuminate the experiences of Black women with Alopecia, a subject seldom discussed or accepted. My aim is to normalize this dialogue and inspire self-love and redefinition, regardless of societal norms. I want to highlight that beauty isn't just one way, it lives and grows inside individuals who choose themselves.

My cinematic inspirations include filmmakers like Ava DuVernay and Nikyatu Jusu, who have consistently told authentic and empowering narratives that investigate and transcend intersections. They uplift and empower Black women in all their work which is something that inspires me. Their work has demonstrated to me the power of honest storytelling and the influence it can wield on society.

During the phases of production and post-production, we made discoveries that influenced the final form of the film. We realized our narrative was not solely about accepting and raising awareness of Alopecia; it was about the authentic nature of living with a visible insecurity, not about altering or fixing it, but about learning to find beauty in the very thing you conceal. The raw and unfiltered real-life experiences I've endured during my journey with Alopecia are embedded in this narrative. I chose to integrate these layers into the film to portray the complexity and multifaceted nature of hair loss.

I hope our audience will leave with a reshaped perspective on beauty, one that surpasses societal norms and expectations. I want them to feel empowered to accept and love themselves just as they are. More importantly, I hope this film instigates a conversation about the intersection of Alopecia and Black hair, and the unnecessary pressure we put on women, particularly Black women, to conform to certain beauty standards.

In Hair or No Hair, we peel back the superficial layers of beauty to expose the truth: sometimes, we're not okay, but we're trying, and that's where resilience and beauty reside within us all. My journey with Alopecia has taught me to perceive beauty in a different light, and now, I wish to share this perspective with the world.
