



<u>synopsis</u>

Isa and Stephan, who met while Isa was a freshman in college, have been married for twenty-one years; a marriage riddled with domestic abuse. Tonight is their twenty-first year anniversary, where another altercation ensues. This time leaving Isa to fight for dear life. In a moment of mental escapism, she confronts the younger versions of herself attempting to gain the freedom she so desperately seeks.

<u>reality</u>

Domestic violence incidents rose in the United States by approximately 8.1% after the imposition of pandemic-related lockdowns, according to an analysis by the National Commission on Covid-19 and Criminal Justice.

I was inspired to redirect my purpose for completing this project, after learning about a childhood friend, whose life had suddenly and sadly been cut short due to the consequence of domestic violence back in August of 2019. And though the events in the film don't directly speak to her own abusive experiences, the journey from romanticizing to needing to desperately grasp that moment of freedom that can ultimately save your life is a universal theme in stories of this nature.

Her twin sister, Veronica, has since started a Facebook group called **Vera's Voice**. Where she has become a staunch advocate in helping more women openly share their traumas around domestic abuse and to find help. I also hope that through this film I, too, can activate more people in crises in domestic abuse situations to begin their own examinations of when, why and how.... that can eventually begin their long awaited healing process.

Director, actor, and educator, Andi Chapman is the Associate Artistic Director of The Ebony Repertory Theatre. Her numerous directing credits include Both/And at Boston Court Pasadena; Native Son at Antaeus and Kirk Douglas Theatres (nominated Best Director by Stage Raw & Broadway World); Ebony Repertory Theatre's *The* Gospel at Colonus (14 Ovation nominations: Best Play & Best Play Direction, Winner: Best Producer NAACP 2016 Theatre Awards); and The Actor's Co-op Steel Magnolias (Best Director award). She was Assistant Director (Center Theatre Group) alongside Phylicia Rashad on Joe Turner's Come and Gone and A Raisin in the Sun (Ovation Award: Best Play). Andi is currently The Center Theatre Group Program Advisor/Coaching Artist for August Wilson's National Monologue Competition, and an Adjunct Professor of Film Acting at Azusa Pacific University. Her film directing credits include the awardwinning shorts Memorial Street, Elijah's Song, and Why? She holds an M.F.A. from the Yale School of Drama and is an alumna of the AFI Directing Workshop for Women. She is also a selected participant of the prestigious Lincoln Center Directors Lab. As an actress, Andi has appeared on 911, The Orville, How to Get Away with Murder, Criminal Minds, NCIS, SMILF, Shameless, Glee, Dexter, 24, Six Feet Under, Short Cuts, The Lower Depths, and Blood Wedding.

Mildred Marie Langford (Isa)

Actor, writer, producer originally from Virginia and now based in Los Angeles. Her previous acting credits include *Grey's Anatomy*, *BOSCH*, *Delilah*, *Chicago MED*, *Masters of Sex*, *BOSS*, *Upload*, *The Good Side of Bad*, *Grow Up and many others*. She also starred in and wrote *Justice for Ezra*. A short film inspired by the senseless shooting of Ahmaud Arbery. Mildred holds a B.A. in Theatre from George Mason University and is an alumnus of The School at Steppenwolf in Chicago. She is currently in pre-production on the film, *NOLA: The Beginning*, a socially visual narrative exploring the perpetual silence of the Black female voice in America. She is a co-founder of the non-profit arts organization, The Black Creators Collective, dedicated to bringing artistic opportunities to low-resourced communities in the South Los Angeles area.



Conisha Wade (Shel)

Actor, writer, producer originally from Ohio. She holds a BFA in Theatre from Howard University and started her career in New York City before moving to Los Angeles. Her theatre credits include *The Vagina Monologues, , Dreamgirls, Maria Kizito* and *Coco Queens*. Cornisha is a recognizable commercial actress for brands such as Toyota, Taco Bell, McDonalds and Samsung. As a member of The Black Creators Collective, she helped produce the inaugural Playwrights "Ink-cubator" series at WACO Theatre. Conisha is also a co-producer of *The Three Phases of Isa*.



DeJuan Christopher (Stephen)

Actor, director, producer and activist originally from South Carolina. He holds a BFA in Theatre from Francis Marion University and is a graduate of the STC program at the American Conservatory Theater. 
