
THE STORY


Today in America, approximately 1 in 4 women will have an abortion before the age of 45. Trans men and nonbinary people have abortions too, though their experiences are rarely reflected in statistics. There are no abortion services in at least 90% of U.S. counties. Only a handful of states offer abortion services after the first trimester, and now with Roe v Wade overturned, the barriers to getting an abortion will only get worse.

Later abortion patients often become the target of political misinformation and attacks and bear the bulk of harassment.

In 'Someone You Know', we meet 3 women - Mindy Swank, Valerie Peterson and Sharon Lagos - who have had abortions later in their pregnancies.

Making the decision to use their real names and faces, each of the women share their complex, heartbreaking and frustrating stories of having to overcome numerous barriers to get the care they needed, at a time in America when reproductive freedom is being rolled back at an alarming pace.








HOW THE FILM STARTED


This film project originally began with the intent to be a tool for advocacy in the lead-up to the 2020 Presidential election, hoping to sway primarily pro-choice voters by educating them on what later abortion is. All the interviews were shot on an iPhone during the height of COVID, in June 2020. The producers sent each of the participants an iPhone 11 with a small ring light to set up in their home or office, and interviewed them remotely via Zoom. However, due to budget restrictions and other extenuating factors, production was paused indefinitely by September. While it was disappointing for the production team not to be able to finish this in time for the election, the hiatus made for serendipitous timing, given what was happening with abortion rights across the country in the following years.

When Roe v Wade was overturned in June 2022, through the Dobbs v Jackson U.S. Supreme Court decision, all of a sudden this film and its message became more important than ever. The extra time gave the production team a chance to develop the stories thoroughly, and think about creative ways to ensure the film had a maximum impact. In 2021 editor Prakshi Malik and animation director Marcia "Marcita" Leite came on board. The use of animation to retell each of the stories would enable more creative freedom without being exploitative toward each of the storytellers. Animation also allowed for more cohesiveness for the overall film.


With financial support from The Harnisch Foundation's Awesome Without Borders grant in 2021, Studio IX's Mother Project grant in 2022, The Creative Power Award in 2022, Dr. Nancy O'Reilly's Women Connect4Good Foundation in 2023, and a successful Kickstarter campaign in October 2022, 'Someone You Know' was able to be completed by the Fall of 2023.

This film was made to help amplify the voices and lived experiences of abortion storytellers, in the hope it will generate empathy and challenge our perspectives. It is not a political film. It is a portrait of what it looks like to be an abortion seeker in America today, having to navigate numerous barriers to get the care they need. The production team hopes this short documentary will remind audiences that everybody loves someone who has had an abortion, and despite what the ugly political and divisive media rhetoric will tell you, the person getting a later abortion is likely someone you know.







Valerie Peterson is an African-American mom of two, a corporate professional living in Texas, born and raised on the Southside of Chicago in a Pentecostal family. Valerie unexpectedly got pregnant for a third time after her two daughters were grown. But at 15 weeks everything started to go wrong. Valerie had to make a hard decision – fast. Living in Texas meant she was up against the clock. By the time she decided to terminate, it was too late and she had to leave the state to get the care she needed in time. Valerie had to take extensive time out of work, which meant telling her boss what was going on. Valerie took all the anger and frustration she felt and has been an outspoken advocate for abortion rights ever since.

Sharon Lagos is a Latina woman from Honduras, who came to the U.S. to study. While back in Honduras on a summer break, she became pregnant by her boyfriend at the time. She was not in a position to have a baby and took a Plan B pill. Since abortion is banned in Honduras, Sharon had to get the pill on the black market. But after returning to school in the US, she discovered she was still pregnant and freaked out. She called her boyfriend who told her that she should "deal with it". Not having a support system around her, Sharon tried to find an abortion clinic. She stumbled upon a crisis pregnancy center, also known commonly as a "fake clinic". Sharon was forced to watch propaganda videos about abortion and told lies about how far along she was in her pregnancy. Sharon left in tears but eventually she found a real abortion clinic. By this time, she was past the first trimester which meant she had to travel out of state to get the procedure, as well as raise thousands of dollars. Her experience was stressful and lonely. Sharon became an abortion storyteller as a way of regaining her power.

Mindy Swank is a mother of three from Illinois, who grew up as a conservative Baptist. When she became pregnant for the second time, she was heartbroken to get a diagnosis that meant her pregnancy would not viable. Mindy assumed her hospital would allow her to terminate, considering the fatal diagnosis. Unfortunately, she was in a Catholic hospital system which refused to help her, because they were bound by the laws of the Catholic Church. As the weeks progressed, Mindy began miscarrying, yet the hospital system still refused to offer her an abortion because they detected a heartbeat and she was not bleeding "enough". At 27 weeks, after a lot of blood loss, she went into labor. It was a traumatic experience that still haunts her to this day. All the laws and religious barriers that stood in her way meant she wasn't able to make the right decision for her, early in her pregnancy.




DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT

"As a storyteller and filmmaker, my goal is human connection. How can I take deep, complex and even divisive issues, and present them in a way that shifts our thinking? I believe personal storytelling is the magical ingredient to enabling people from all different backgrounds to understand one another and find empathy.

As someone who left a conservative Evangelical church and saw the first-hand impact of creating an environment based on fear and misinformation around abortion despite women secretly having abortions, and as a filmmaker who has seen the way industry executives shy away from this topic despite many of them personally going through the experience, I know there is so much more to explore in this topic than what has been presented in news media and politics.

My goal is to humanize this issue through the storytelling of the women featured. It is not a political film. It is an invitation to hear a different perspective and challenge pre-conceived notions about later abortion. As Renee Bracey Sherman beautifully states in the film, I hope people who 'Someone You Know' will understand that everyone love someone who has had an abortion, an they should think about the stigma they are taking in, and how it is impacting the people they love." - Asha Dahya





















CALL-TO-ACTION

As <u>WeTestify.org</u> founder Renee Bracey Sherman states in the documentary, "abortion storytelling has changed the conversation".

There is no one who has more expertise about abortion than the person who has an abortion, and this film not only positions abortion storytellers as the experts, it centers their lived experiences and first-person testimonials as the dominant narrative. For too long, pro choice politicians have allowed the anti-choice opposition to take up all the space in the room, spreading misinformation and dominating the narrative.

This film is targeted toward pro choice viewers - the more than 60% of Americans who believe abortion should remain legal. But we are not the loudest voice in the room, and haven't been for decades as evidenced by the onslaught of anti-choice legislation that successfully wound its way through state legislatures, U.S. Congress, and the Supreme Court.

So what has changed since the June 2022 Supreme Court Dobbs decision overturning Roe v Wade? Abortion storytelling. When an individual speaks up about their experience, they are pushing back on the narrative that this is an uncomfortable or unpopular topic. With 1 in 4 Americans needing this procedure, it is likely that the person getting an abortion is either you, or someone you know.

With this in mind, the call-to-action for 'Someone You Know' is to support and donate to WeTestify the largest abortion storytelling and advocacy organization in the United States, helping storytellers share their experiences in media, on Capitol Hill, in court houses across the country, and in documentaries like this.

We want to empower others to share their experience, and be part of a forward-thinking movement that is enabling change on abortion rights state by state, voice by voice, story by story.
